Policy / Decision surrounding practice:

- 1. The approved form for the OPHA documents statutory requirements for assessment of the other parent's home. These include:
 - Demographics (Contact/Identifying Information, Worker Contact Information, Other Household Members, Non-resident Children, Placements)
 - Background Screening (including Presumption of Detriment Explanation, if applicable)
 - Assessment to assess the parent's ability and willingness to care for his/her child(ren)
 - Financial Security, Resources and Child Care Arrangements
 - Attestation and Acknowledgement
 - Approval/Denial
- 2. Complete a DCF child abuse history check and criminal background screening, including fingerprints, of the other parent and all adult household members.
- 3. Enter a Case Note type of "Other Parent Home Assessment" documenting that the OPHA has been completed, and attach the form using the "Upload Image" hyperlink.
