II. What is the mission of the Advisory Board?

- a. Empowers young people with lived experience to shape policies, programs, and systems that impact their lives.
- b. To ensure foster youth voices are heard, valued, and transformed into action that creates better opportunities and outcomes for every young person in care.
- c. To create the foundation of knowledge of the system of care as well as identify what policy works and how it got there historically.
- d. To take youth with lived experience voices and amplify them in the community.
- e. Building youth leaders who use their lived experience to advocate, inspire change, and improve outcomes for children and families across Florida.
- f. Youth-empowered committee fighting to influence legislation for the betterment of child welfare.
- g. To improve the child welfare system through youth voices.
- h. Empowering youth with lived experience to lead, advocate, and drive positive change in Florida's child welfare system while ensuring every voice is heard and valued.
- i. To give youth the tools to maneuver spaces with system professionals.
- j. Young people coming together to create statewide change to improve experiences
- k. To empower youth in foster care by encouraging creativity, leadership, and teamwork. We provide a space where every voice matters, every idea is...
- l. To give youth a space to speak freely

III. What is the purpose of the Advisory Board?

- a. To create meaningful opportunities for youth leadership, advocacy, and partnership that improve outcomes for Florida's children and families.
- b. To ensure youth voices are represented in policies, programs, and decisions that impact children and families across Florida.
- c. To empower youth in foster care by providing a safe space to share ideas, develop leadership skills, build meaningful connections, and help shape programs and opportunity positively impact the youth

- d. To promote youth leadership, advocacy, and civic engagement while improving outcomes for children and families
- e. To unite youth leaders across Florida to advocate for equity, opportunity, and positive change in child welfare
- f. To ensure current and former foster youth help shape decisions, policies and services that strengthen Florida's child welfare system.
- g. To foster collaboration between youth and stakeholders to create policies and practices that better support children and families
- h. To make sure youth voices are heard in decisions, policy, changes, etc...
- i. To have young people come together to create everlasting change, leadership, civic engagement, opportunities, while building community.
- j. To provide youth led guidance that strengthens policies, programs and opportunities for current and former foster youth.
- k. To connect youth leaders across Florida and promote advocacy, leadership, and positive system change.
- l. To keep child welfare the priority of foster care in a system that businesses driven by profit often forget or abandon for business gains.
- m. To build a network of youth advocates committed to improving the lives of children and families through leadership and service.
- n. To inspire youth to lead with purpose, advocate with confidence, and create lasting change in their communities.
- o. To give youth with lived experience an opportunity to have an impact by developing their voice through obtaining knowledge of the system + speaking directly to system professionals statewide.
- p. how? by getting youth with lived experiences/ homelessness voices to help with policies, bills, and programs.
- q. To develop leadership qualities that allow youth with lived experience to maneuver professional settings as well as lead in their community.
- r. To create opportunities for youth to lead, collaborate, and advocate for a stronger, more responsive child welfare system
- s. To build youth to be knowledgeable enough of the system to identify what exactly they want to see change.

IV. How does the Advisory Board determine goals / priorities?

- a. Majority vote based off all youth representatives from each advisory board.
- b. By reviewing youth-identified needs, current child welfare trends, and recommendations from council members and stakeholders.
- c. Council members submit ideas, discuss them, and vote on the top 3–5 priorities each year.
- d. Create a strategic plan
- e. Recognizing the corruption in the system truthfully and building a plan to tackle it head-on
- f. Maybe we can follow up with the priority by doing a survey

- g. sets goals by listening to youth in foster care, gathering feedback, and working together to identify the biggest needs. Priorities are based on what will have the greatest positive impact
- h. Member brainstorming sessions followed by consensus-building or voting
- i. Survey Monkey*
- j. Using google form or similar. NOT mentee
- k. Brainstorm session in-person of many priorities, whittle down to smaller list of priorities (3-5)
- l. Using 3-4 max on topics yet be mindful with any federal practices to be on a state level like the FYI vouchers. Even try to better statewide practices by voting quarterly or 2x a year
- m. Collecting data on normalcy/life skills (jobs, school, removals, aging out, exit surveys, ombudsman reviews, OCC requests, maltreatments,)
- n. Accountability in services
- o. Evaluate the effectiveness of the system currently
- p. A poll can help determine. Maybe we can all come up with a list of things and then do a poll. We can follow up by doing a survey
- q. Through a feedback session that later breaks out into voting to work on what is prioritized first-last
- r. Prioritize issues based on urgency, the number of youth affected, and whether the council can realistically make an impact
- s. The council will determine priorities through member discussion and voting, youth feedback, data on emerging needs, and collaboration with stakeholders, ensuring youth voice remains the primary factor
- t. Through being aware of what other organizations are prioritizing and picking what is not as prevalent to focus on.
- u. Recommendations from council committees based on research and youth feedback.
- v. I was thinking of collecting research while we are working on priorities from youth
- w. Prioritize by sections such as stable housing, K-12 and/or higher education, placement living, etc. by voting members of ages 16 - 26. We can take some input from community members yet it's the board.
- x. Seeing the differences of a regular household upbringing vs the normalcy of a foster home in comparison
- y. Outline strategic plans with timeframes and designated points of contact
- z. Depending on the voting topic, include non-voting members who are within the age range
- aa. Identify goals/priorities to determine data requests

V. What changes, if any, would you make to the existing eligibility requirements?

- a. Non-voting until 28 which is when the tuition waiver ends
- b. Voting and non-voting members. If feels like the non-voting members voices are valued as much...
- c. Voting members should be until 25
- d. Add "in Florida" at the end...

- e. Add homeless youth with no child welfare experience. Maybe we can partner with the school district to receive support from McKinney Vento (federal act)
- f. If we are not able to pay members of 23+ then, pay officer roles only... everyone else is voting member just not paid.
- g. Pay officer roles yet have lessor pay for non-officer roles (maybe)
- h. Officer roles should be for anyone who is on the council/ what happens if the people who are within the current guidelines do not want to run/are not in the headspace for the responsibility.
- i. If not all homeless youth/young adults, then unaccompanied homeless youth
- j. Raise the age cap for voting members
- k. Voting roles until 25 or 26 because of the FYI vouchers
- l. Change Chafee to fit federal language
- m. 18-25 for voting members but having mentor roles be added for 25+.
- n. I would include adopted and homelessness youth because they are not connected to a CBC. I think the voting members should be 14-26, and non-voting members 14-28. We need especially younger voices.
- o. Adding adopted youth should be added on the side if they were placed back in foster care or became an unaccompanied homeless youth
- p. I say 14-26 because 18 and under are currently being affected by changes in the system. But if not at least 16-26. Of course, 18-26 are being affected by other things.
- q. Whole advisory board should be able to vote for who they want to best represent them
- r. Should we discuss the term of non-voting & voting?
